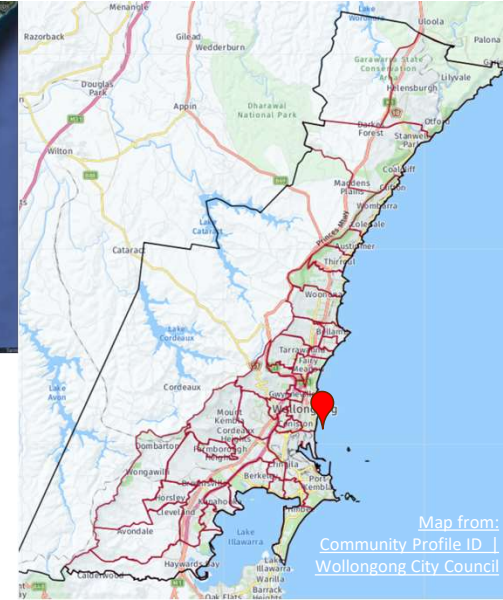

Our populated areas - distinct from our gorgeous bushlands, parks and dams - are:

- the villages of Helensburgh, Stanwell Park... in our north
- a very narrow strip ($\leq 1\text{km}$) bordered by the escarpment and sea from Coalcliff to Austinmer
- a still somewhat narrow strip down to Corrimal-East Corrimal
- a widening area as we head further south, including Lake Illawarra and Windang, to our major growth area in West Dapto (the escarpment shapes inland, giving more flat land suitable for housing).

Picking up a Project Mid-Stream

- **Staff Fluctuations, including**
 - Many acting positions in Libraries, including many in leadership
 - Two changes of manager for Learning City Project Leader
 - Divisional Manager has moved out from Council
 - Library Manager soon leaving Council
- **Project Management approach and documentation**
 - 2021 Steering group was representative of a wider interest in Council
 - 2022 this had become quite niche, focusing only in Library and Community Centres
- **Gathering and understanding existing project achievements**
 - Aspirational language in documents
 - Inconsistent messages about what was and wasn't delivered
 - Lack of detailed project management plan or analysis of final criteria
- **Bodies of Knowledge to digest – and still learning**
 - UNESCO and Learning Cities
 - Wollongong Council's people and teams
 - Wollongong Council's strategic framework, operations, processes
 - Wollongong LGA's profile and learning environment
 - Learning City and Collective Impact methodology

- 6.3 Effective and integrated regional transport with a focus on road, bus, rail and freight movement (including the port of Port Kembla).
- 6.4 Plan and provide sustainable infrastructure for safe and liveable places integrated with the environment and accessible to key transport routes.
- 6.5 Advocate for strong transport links within the Local Government Area and connections to Sydney, the South Coast, and the Southern Highlands to provide physical and economic opportunities.
- 6.6 Improve active transport links and connectivity to our unique places and spaces, including marine access along the Local Government Area and accessibility from the Central Business District to the foreshore.
- 6.7 Maintain the service levels of our roads, footpaths and cycleways to an acceptable standard.
- 6.8 Community transport options for frail older people, people with disabilities and the transport disadvantaged are actively promoted and available.
